Art in the public realm is a defining feature of Walyalup / Fremantle, enriching its streetscapes, celebrating its cultural identity, and inviting dialogue among residents and visitors alike.

It is diverse and evolving — from figurative bronzes, free-standing sculptures to painted murals, decorative street furniture, integrated designs and mosaics.

Public artworks are commissioned through a variety of pathways, including initiatives led by the City of Fremantle, artist-led projects, community groups, and private commissions.

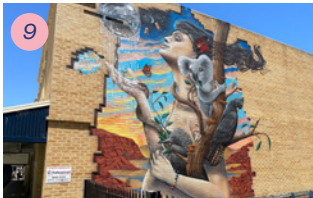
